Disadvantages

Informal Education: No conscious attempts are made in this kind of education. It is neither intentional nor preplanned. They may learn it at home, in a hotel, or at a market. Informal education, as contrast to formal education, is not delivered by a facility like a school or college. Informal education is not delivered on a set schedule. There is no mandated curriculum. Experiences and actual life in the family or community make up informal education.

Advantages of Informal Education

- It entails activities including independent and selfdirected research on a subject of interest using books, libraries, social media, the internet, or seeking help from unofficial trainers.
- Employs a variety of techniques.
- There is no set timeframe.
- A quicker and less expensive learning process.
- There is no need to hire specialists because many professionals are eager to share their priceless information with students and the general public online and through social media.
